
Our annual Careers Convention was a very busy and successful event with lots of external exhibitors supporting our Year 9, Year 10 and Year 11 learners with decisions about their future.

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Turvey Building open for Psychology

Solihull Sixth Form College opened a brand-new building on campus this term.

The Turvey Building, housing eight new classrooms for Psychology, opened after half-term thanks to a £2,072,512 grant from the Department of Education and a £692,000 investment from the Summit Learning Trust. A net zero project from TG Escapes, this modular building provides modern and spacious classrooms for Psychology and an ideal teaching and learning environment.

Nicola Holmes, Curriculum Leader for Psychology, commented:

"Psychology is currently the biggest A level subject here at the College, with approximately 600 learners across Year 12 and Year 13. It's absolutely fantastic for us as a department to be teaching in the brand-new Turvey building. The classrooms are modern and spacious and clearly set the tone for serious study."

Year 13 Psychology learner Denisa added:

"What I like most about the Turvey Building is that it's spacious and if offers us the opportunity to do a wide range of activities in class. It's nice for the biggest subject in College to have its own designated space. The design of it is very calming and peaceful and that goes really well with the subject we are studying."

The building has been named after Malcolm Turvey, who taught at the College for his entire 44-year career before retiring in 2023. He was a highly skilled and passionate teacher who loved being in the classroom. Malcolm is a true polymath and was able to teach all subjects across the Social Sciences Curriculum area, although he specialised in Economics. He held the post of Curriculum Leader for 22 years, leading a team with a calm and supportive demeanour. All who have worked with Malcolm found him to be a great reassurance, a source of inspiration and an outstanding role model.



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College learners on fieldtrips

Learners at Solihull Sixth Form College have been on a variety of fieldtrips this term to stretch their learning. This has included an overseas trip to Spain and day trips closer to home.

Spanish arts

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Visual Arts students travelled to Spain during the half-term holidays to explore galleries, museums and the prominent architectural sights of Madrid. The residential fieldtrip enabled Visual Arts learners to experience a different culture and get inspiration for their own portfolios from some world-famous artwork on display in the Madrid galleries.

Among the art galleries and museums they visited, learners saw works from Holbein and Hopper at the Museo Nacional Thyssen-Bornemisza. They also saw famous works like Picasso's Guernica,



as well as pieces by Miro, Dali and Calder, at the Museo Reina Sofia. The Museo Del Prado was another stop on their itinerary, as they explored artwork by Goya, Raphael, Velazquez, El Greco and Bosch.

Other places of interest in Madrid included a visit to the Teatro Real to learn about the architecture and history, as well as a tour of the Royal Palace. Students took a tour of Madrid by foot, visiting areas such as Puerta del Sol, Plaza Mayor and Mercado de San Miguel and they enjoyed an evening visit to Temple of De Bod. They visited the El Rastro Market, La Latina area and the Botanical Gardens. The final site of interest in their trip was the Bernabeu Stadium, home of Real Madrid Football Club, to explore the architecture and engineering of the world-famous stadium.

Meanwhile, Historians at the College undertook a twoday fieldtrip to London. They participated in a workshop at the National Archives to explore primary evidence about whether there was a 'Crisis in the Reign of Mary I'. They were able to handle original documents as part of the workshop and were treated to seeing some 'showcase' sources such as the original copy of King Henry VIII's will. Day 1 of the fieldtrip also saw learners take a walking tour of key sights in London followed by a trip to watch the musical 'Six' about Henry VIII's six wives on The Strand.

The second day of the trip involved a full-day student conference, at which expert university lecturers from leading Universities delivered relevant lectures on 'Russia in Revolution'. These lectures were highly relevant to their A level unit on Russian history and some of our learners impressed the lecturers by posing challenging and sophisticated questions to them during the Question-and-Answer sessions.

Computer Science - Bletchley Park

Computer Science learners also headed out on the road, as they visited Bletchley Park to learn about the advances in computer science that took place during the Second World War. This was a site of great importance, where a team of mathematicians broke the Enigma code to enable them to decipher secret German messages and prevent many attacks. Alan Turing designed a machine called the Bombe, which was able to decode messages by cycling through all possible combinations in about 20 minutes, far faster than would be possible by people. Use of that and a computer called the Colossus were hailed as one of the most significant victories for the Allies during the war.



Learners explored the modern-day Bletchley Park by viewing the interactive displays and museum collections, as well as watching the immersive films set within the restored historic buildings.

The Gambia project 2024

Finally, a group of 28 young people have just returned from a life-enhancing trip to The Gambia, having raised over £18,000 this year for a school in the West African country. It was the ninth visit to Africa with the College's Team Gambia project and more than £92,000 has been raised since the initiative started in 2013.

While in the Gambia, students spent every morning at the Abuko Nursery and Lower Basic School and taught the children (aged 4 to 6) in small groups. As there was a language barrier to overcome, many of the activities that the learners undertook with the children were active and visual, such as singing, craftwork, word and picture matching and there were lots of outdoor fun and games too.



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Charity and Christmas Cheer

Our learners have raised nearly £900 for our local hospital charity University Hospitals Birmingham (UHB) thanks to Christmas carol concerts at their hospitals.

Learners performed carols at hospitals across Birmingham and Solihull to raise funds for the University Hospitals Birmingham Charity, which supports four of the largest hospitals in Birmingham:

• Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham, Heartlands Hospital, Good Hope Hospital and Solihull Hospital.

From tiny newborns on the Neonatal Unit, to elderly patients living with dementia, the Charity supports more than two million patients and their families, as well as 25,000+ members of hospital staff, every year.

They provide 'added extras' that are over and above what the NHS provides as standard, including helping to refurbish wards and departments, purchase vital, state-of-the-art equipment, fund life-saving research and more.

The Charity also supports our armed forces by running Fisher House UK, a "home away from home" for military families on the site of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham, home to the Royal Centre for Defence Medicine.

Last Christmas, learners from Summit Learning Trust academies helped decorate Fisher House in a display of festive spirit.
